Dear sir,

The notice of environmental authorisation for the proposed Shongweni regional general landfill site (dated 10 August 2016) refers.

I <u>strongly object</u> to the location of this proposed landfill site and the issue of EA (reference number DM/009/2015) and the Waste Management License (Reference number DM/WML/0009/10). I wish to appeal this approval according to regulation 4(1) of the National Appeals Regulations, 2014 for the following reasons:

- 1) Adequate public consultation and advertising was not carried out on the process leading to your decision. This is evident by the fact that I, and a vast majority of residents in the Upper Highway and KwaNdengezi district were not aware that this application was even happening until after environmental authorisation had been granted (please refer to Appendix 1 for attached email string with WSP indicating that an application for the Shongweni landfill site only came to my knowledge after coming across an article in the Highway Mail referring to the proposed Cato Ridge landfill). Furthermore the fact that I was not aware of this process means I did not register as an Interested and Affected Party which I would have done at the time; as a landfill located here directly affects me.
- 2) My house is located a distance of merely 3.05km (as per Appendix 2) away from this proposed landfill site and it will be visible from my house. The existing Enviroserv Shongweni Landfill site is already visible and I will now have a view of two landfill sites. This will greatly affect property value and quality of life.
- 3) The smell and health problems from the landfill gas which will be present in my neighbourhood (Winston Park) and surrounding areas. I have a lot of experience with landfill sites and gas migration and I know that LFG migration and odour will be a problem, especially at this distance. An example of this is Bisasar Road landfill site where strong odours can often be smelt as far as 45th Cutting despite the fact that active and extensive gas extraction is taking place on this site. In addition, we are currently experiencing bad odours with reports of respiratory problems, nausea and other adverse health effects all around the Upper Highway caused by the existing Enviroserv Shongweni Landfill site (refer to Appendix 3) and this new landfill is proposed to be placed only a few hundred meters from this. Two landfills in the same vicinity would only compound this problem and will also result in fingers being pointed as to whose problem it is with nobody taking responsibility.
- 4) The prevailing wind is a South Westerly and will therefore pose further potential of extended radius for odours. My house lies directly North East of the proposed Shongweni landfill and the wind will therefore drag the odours further. Please refer to Appendix 2 and 4 supporting this argument.
- 5) This Landfill borders on the existing Giba Gorge Environmental Precinct which is enjoyed by many people as a favoured recreational area. Another landfill located here is not going to benefit this or the expansion of the environmental precinct in any way. The Giba Precinct is currently in the process of being incorporated as a state recognised conservancy meaning it will have full "conservancy status". I am personally contributing to the Giba Precinct via

- special rates and as such feel the placement of a landfill site is unfair and compromises the long term goal of improving and expanding environmental protection of this area.
- 6) My company is heavily involved in landfill gas extraction and management at the Bisasar Road Landfill site and gas-to-energy project in Springfield Park and many other landfills around the country. I am well aware of the informal dwellings, scavenging and criminal element that comes with landfilling (even well managed sites). Anyone taking a drive down Bisasar Road would be shocked to see the state of the roads in the vicinity due to scavengers stealing everything they can get their hands on from the back of passing vehicles. I have personally been a victim of having my vehicle stoned because I would not allow the scavengers to remove goods from the back of my bakkie. I have even witnessed a police vehicle being petrol bombed as a result of trying to clamp down on scavenging.
- 7) There is a growing community bordering this proposed location (KwaNdengezi/Dassenhoek) as well as a local school. The increase in traffic and disposal trucks would be a real safety concern to these school children. The increased dust would also be a health and safety concern.

There are also numerous local facilities which this new landfill site will adversely affect; The Horizon Farm (home for intellectually impaired adults) and the Giba Gorge Cycle Park, as an example.

In summary I am opposed to the development of this proposed landfill and the submission of this letter serves as an official appeal against the granting of the Shongweni Landfill management permit.

Two landfills in the same vicinity would only compound this problem and will also result in fingers being pointed as to who's problem it is and nobody taking responsibility.
- 2) The prevailing wind is a South Westerly and will therefore pose further potential of extended radius for odours.


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

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
