

Wrestler Hart had a big heart

OWEN Hart, who died Sunday night in a freak accident, wasn't the biggest wrestling star.

But he was probably the hardest worker, definitely the most respected and one of the really good guys.

A few years ago, I brought some children backstage before a World Wrestling Federation show at The Summit. It was a prize their parents had won at a charity fund-raiser.

Hart had arrived early and was stretching his leg muscles against a wall. I asked him if he would say hello to some fans.

"I'm really hurting tonight. My knee is torn up and if I don't stretch it out, I can't wrestle. Normally I'd do it, but could you ask somebody else?" he said.

Hart looked beaten, and the night hadn't even started. While the ring action is choreographed, the bumps and bruises are real.

Wrestlers live in pain. Hart's knee was purple. It had a lump on it the size of a baseball. I told him, "no problem" and started looking for another wrestler.

When he heard a few other wrestlers say no to me, he called back, "Are these children or adults you want me to meet?" I said, "They're kids. They're about 10 years old."

Hart stood up from the chair. "OK, bring 'em over. I could use something to cheer me up."

He spent 15 minutes answering the children's questions. He gave them autographs and flipped them upside down for photos. He dug into his suitcase and gave the kids T-shirts and wristbands.

As we were leaving, he shook each of their hands and asked them to "cheer real loud" for him. The children were thrilled to meet him and kept saying how "cool" Owen was.

After thanking Hart for taking the time, he said, "I have two children at home. What am I going to do, say no to kids?"
