**GNK** Dinamo has continued its impressive run on the European stage: our club has qualified for the group phase of the UEFA club competitions a remarkable 16 times in the last 17 seasons. It has also reached the knockout stage three times in the past five years. Overall, this is our 19th participation in the group stages of the UEFA competitions. In this record, GNK Dinamo has played in the UEFA Champions League eight times, in the UEFA Cup/Europa League ten times, and will now make its debut in the UEFA Europa Conference League. Furthermore, our club concluded the previous season by securing its 34th national championship title in its history, with 24 of them won in the independent Croatian league which has been launched back in 1992. In the past

18 seasons alone, Dinamo has clinched 17 national championship titles. This may seem like dry statistics, but it clearly demonstrates a continuity of success both domestically and internationally, reflecting the high standards that the club has set for itself in recent history. We conceived and implemented the idea of creating a firm Central European club with the goal of building, preserving, and enhancing a strong system at all levels - in business, organization, and the sporting aspect. We have created a platform on which GNK Dinamo has achieved its longest streak of club trophies, producing historic generations of players who led the Croatian national team to the silver and broze medals at the FIFA World Cups and to the UEFA Nations League finals.

GNK Dinamo is the most successful Croatian football club and was founded on April 26, 1911, under the name "Prvi hrvatski građanski športski klub" (literally translated as the "First Croatian Citizens' Football Club"), or simply - Gradjanski or "Citizens"". Therefore, the clubs' prefix was changed from NK (FC) to GNK (Citizens' Football Club) with the letter G symbolizing the clubs' roots with the ancient name of Gradjanski. The new prefix was added before the club's annual assembly ahead of the 100th anniversary celebration. In its rich history, the club has won 66 trophies. Among these achievements are 34 national championship titles, with 24 of them coming in the Prva HNL (Croatian First Football League), 23 Croatian Cup titles, including 16 in Croatia, and eight Croatian Supercups. Notably, Dinamo also stands out with its victory in the Inter-Cities Fairs Cup, a competition that later evolved into the UEFA Cup and today's UEFA Europa League. Dinamo was the 1963 finalist and later claimed the title in 1967.


The club from Maksimir has participated in European competitions a total of 19 times, including eight appearances in the UEFA Champions League, 10 in the UEFA Europa League, and one in the UEFA Europa Conference League. Special attention is drawn to their second-place finish in the Champions League group stage in 1998/99 and three recent European knockout stages in the UEFA Europa League: the Round of 16 in 2018/'19, the quarter-finals in 2020/'21, and the Intermediate round in 2021/'22.

In the distant past, when the club was named "Gradjanski," there were no continental club competitions, so friendly matches played a significant role. During that time, Gradjanski defeated Barcelona in the away game, scored five goals against Liverpool in Zagreb, defeated Juventus twice in a week, beat both Inter and Milan within two weeks, and outplayed the top three Turkish clubs in Istanbul. There was also a 0-0 draw in a friendly match against the Brazilian national team in Zagreb.

During that time, "Purgeri" (the popular nickname of the Zagreb citizens and the club iteself) won six national championship titles as Gradjanski and later they continued their winning ways under the Dinamo name, clinching the state championship four times. Many will point out that during this period, they were actually champions five times,

but their 1979 title, although judicially awarded to Dinamo, was not officially credited in the archives of the Football Federation of Yugoslavia.

Since 2005, the club reached its longest streak of trophies, producing historic generations of players, including former Dinamo captain Luka Modrić, who emerged from our youth academy and rose to become the world's best footballer. The club has maintained a tradition of nurturing young talents, and Dinamo played a key role in the success of the Croatian national team. In the 2018 FIFA World Cup there were 14 players who played for GNK Dinamo urina their career including national team captain, FIFA Player of the World and Ballon d'Or winner Luka Modrić who came through our club's youth academy. GNK Dinamo Zagreb holds a record relating to the FIFA World Cup. No other club has had more homegrown players in a FIFA World Cup final than GNK Dinamo Zagreb. Former GNK Dinamo players also had a key role four years later when Croatia secured bronze at the World Cup in Qatar, as well as this year when our national team reached the finals of the **UEFA** Nations League.

The unique natural harmony of the park and the game of football... In such an environment, the concept of the new football pitch was envisioned back in 1911, and a year later, the project to build a sports field near Maksimir Park was implemented. The park, the Zoo, and the stadium, three symbols of Zagreb located side by side in perfect harmony between nature and sports, have become an integral part of our city's identity.

The construction of the stadium complex began in 1953, according to the design by the architect Vladimir Turina. The stadium was built in stages, and in June 2011, the club's management decided to invest in the city property and renovate part of the complex by 2013. They installed new seats, a heated pitch, an automatic irrigation system, artificial turf around the field, a modern club hotel, top-notch locker rooms, a chapel, and numerous practice fields with artificial turf where over 500 young footballers from Dinamo's academy train.

The pitch was originally planted in 1951 and lasted a full 58 years until 2009, when it was replaced after two back-to-back U2 concerts held at a full stadium. The field couldn't withstand the strain, so it was replaced, and a heating system was also installed. Since the summer of 2018, a new hybrid surface, consisting of 70% natural grass and 30% artificial turf, has been used on the pitch.

Unfortunately, due to an earthquake in Zagreb and the surrounding area on March 22, 2020, the eastern stand remains out of use for safety reasons.



Coach Jakirović

Sergej Jakirović took over the team od GNK Dinamo in this Augustand secured two important victories in the first two league matches, both derbies against Rijeka and Osijek. Although he already won convincingly against Sparta Prague in his debut match on the Maksimir bench, in the first leg of the UEFA Europa League play-off, the Czechs managed to overturn the result in the return leg. Nevertheless, coach Jakirović, with three wins in his first four appearances, has shown strong foundations in his initial matches, bringing optimism ahead of the group stage of the UEFA Europa Conference League.

His coaching journey reveals a clear and proper path, starting with youth teams, progressing through the second division, and moving up to higher levels. He began his coaching career with U-19 teams in Dugo Selo, continued in Sesvete, and then came to Gorica where he secured a great fifth-place finish in the 2018/19 Prva HNL (top tier of Croatian football). After a brief stint in Slovenian side Maribor, he achieved a remarkable success with Zriniski Mostar, leading them to the 2021/22 Bosnia and Herzegovina championsship title, with a staggering 27-point lead over the second-placed Tuzla City. Since November 2022, Jakirović has been in charge of Rijeka, elevating them from seventh place to the upper part of the table and securing a spot in European competitions.

In his communication, he is open, direct, full of energy, and he strives to transmit his character to the team itself.

# DONIRAJ i POSTANI PRIJATELJ ZAKLADE

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With two consecutive championship titles in recent years, Ballkani can comfortably be regarded as a football giant within Kosovo, coming from the town of Suhareka, a suburb of Prizren.

Ballkani was founded in 1947 under the name Rinia, and its current name was adopted in 1965 when the club was taken over by the local chemical-rubber company.

For much of its history, especially during the former Yugoslavia, the club played in lower, amateur leagues and lived in the shadow of its immediate neighbor, Liria from Prizren, a club that played in the second league at that time. The most well-known Kosovo clubs in Yugoslavia were Priština and Trepča, which participated in the first league, along with occasional second-league teams like Liria, Vëllaznimi, Besa (then Budućnost)...

In the independent Kosovo league, Ballkani danced between the first and third tiers. It dropped from the elite class in the summer of 2000, returned ten years later, only to slip back into the second and even the third league. It has been a regular member of the top tier of Kosovo football since the summer of 2018, where it initially secured eighth place, then twice finished in third place, followed by two consecutive championship titles.

The most significant step forward in its history occurred in the last three years when it first reached the final of the Kosovo Cup in 2020, narrowly losing to Priština 1-0. It was followed by two back to back championship titles in 2022 and 2023, as well as the Super Cup trophy in 2023. During this period, it qualified for the group stage of the UEFA Europa Conference League twice in a row.

In the summer of 2022, Ballkani became the first Kosovar club to qualify for the group stage of UEFA competitions and the only one to reach the play-offs. Last year, in the play-offs, it overcame Shkupi from Skopje, North Macedonia, and then in the group stage earned four points by defeating Turkish Sivasspor 4-3 away and drawing 1-1 against Romanian CFR Cluj. It put up a strong fight in Prague against Slavia, leading twice but ultimately losing 3-2 to the Czech team.

This season, in the playoffs, Ballkani outplayed the former UEFA Champions League participant, Belarusian BATE Borisov, with a convincing 4-1 victory in the first match in Priština advancing to the group stage.

The team of Ballkani is coached by Ilir Daja, a former footballer whose playing career was set back by a serious knee injury in 1989 and then concluded two years later. After an extended absence from football, he began coaching in 2005. He won the Albanian championship three times with different clubs: Elbasani in the 2005/06 season, Dinamo Tirana in the 2007/08 season, and Skënderbeu in the 2017/18 season, securing both the domestic championsship and the cup title with the same team. In that season, under Daja's management, Skënderbeu defeated GNK Dinamo Zagreb in the Europa League play-offs, marking the only instance in the last 17 seasons that Dinamo did not reach the group stage of a European competition. Daja continued his trophy harvest after moving from Albania to Kosovo. In January 2022, he took over the helm of Ballkani, guiding the team to the Kosovan championship. He continued his spell with successful journey through the UEFA Europa Conference League qualifying rounds, making Ballkani the first Kosovan club in history to participate in a group stage of the UEFA competitions. In the following season, he once again clinched the championship title and successfully navigated all obstacles on the path to the UECL group stage



Ballkani is a Kosovar top-tier football club based in Suhareka, a town with just over 10,000 inhabitants, and the entire municipality around 60,000. It is located in the southern part of the country, 18 kilometers from Prizren, the second-largest city in Kosovo. The name of the town can be written in several ways; in the Serbian language, it is Suva Reka, which literally means "Dry River", in the Albanian version Suharekë and Suhareka as a derivation from the Slavic root, or Therandë and Theranda in alternative Albanian form.

From 1929 to 1941, Suhareka was part of the Vardar Banovina province in the former Kingdom of Yugoslavia. Unfortunately, like the general history of Kosovo, it has undergone difficult times in its history. The worst days are associated with the Kosovo War from 1996 to 1999.

The football club Ballkani, like all Kosovar clubs, plays its European matches in the capital and largest city, Priština, inhabited by just over 150,000 people. Priština is the center of cultural, political, and administrative power in the country. Since November 2023, the Fadil Vokrri Stadium in Priština has been temporarily closed for European matches, due to not meeting the UEFA standards, especially the pitch, so Ballkani hosted the last home game in Tirana.

Priština is also the sports center of Kosovo, where football tops the popularity list, while basketball and handball occupy second and third places. Moreover, Priština has been chosen by the International Olympic Committee to host the Mediterranean Games in 2030.



The Fadil Vokrri Stadium is a multi-purpose stadium in Priština, the capital of Kosovo, and is home to the FC Priština and the Kosovo national football team. Since the home stadium of Ballkani, with a capacity of only 3,000, does not meet UEFA standards for European competitions, the club plays its home matches in Priština. Nevertheless, Fadil Vokrri Stadium itself has been temporarily closed for European matches at the end of 2023 due to not meeting the criteria, especially regarding the pitch.

It has a capacity of almost 14,000 and until 2018 was known as Priština City Stadium or colloquiially Stadium by Prištevica (river). In 2018 it was renamed after Fadil Vokrri, former great striker of Priština, as well as a Yugoslav

international, who later served as the president of the Kosovo Football Federation. The stadium was renamed on the same day Vokrri passed away. The name change was initiated by the mayor of Pristina.

Built in the early 1950s, the stadium has undergone several renovations and experienced high attendance during the Yugoslav league era, particularly after Priština reached the top league in the first half of the 1980s. It has a capacity of 13,980 seats and has hosted two major concerts featuring popular American rappers 50 Cent and Snoop Dogg. In December 2007, the famous rapper 50 Cent held a concert that marked the largest recorded attendance in the history of the stadium, 25,000 people.

Ballkani coach, Ilir Daja, led the Albanian side Skënderbeu in 2017 when they defeated Dinamo in the UEFA Europa League play-offs. The first leg in Zagreb ended 1-1, which was followed by a 0-0 draw, allowing the Albanian team to advance thanks to the away goal. It was the only instance in 17 seasons that Dinamo did not qualify for the group stage of UEFA competitions.

Dinamo coach, Sergej Jakirović, started the season at Rijeka when they played against the Kosovar team Dukagjini in the UEFA Europa Conference League second qualifying round. Rijeka won both matches, 1-0 in Priština and 6-1 in Rijeka.

Ballkani defender, Bajram Jashanica, played against Dinamo four times wearing the Skënderbeu jersey. In the 2015/16 UEFA Champions League play-offs, Dinamo won both games, 2-1 in Albania and 4-1 in Zagreb. Two years later, Skënderbeu beat Dinamo in the UEFA Europa League play-offs.

Ballkani left-back, Leonit Abazi, also played for Skënderbeu against Dinamo in 2015. He participated in the first leg in Albania, where Dinamo won 2-1.

Bajram Jashanica and former Dinamo defender Amir Rrahmani formed the central defensive pair for the Kosovo national team in the match against Croatia at Maksimir Stadium in September 2017 during the World Cup qualifiers. The match, which Croatia won 1-0, was played over two days due to heavy rain and a waterlogged pitch. It was interrupted in the 21st minute and resumed the next day.

Ballkani includes former Dinamo player Bernard Karrica in its lineup. Karrica played for Dinamo U-19 and Dinamo II before appearing in a friendly match for the first team.

Three Ballkani players have experience in the Croatian First Football League (Prva HNL): Bernard Karrica played for Rijeka and Hrvatski Dragovoljac, Arb Manaj for Slaven Belupo, and Lumbardh Dellova for Haiduk.

Walid Hamidi and Mamadou Danfa played against Dinamo in July 2022 for Macedonian side Shkupi in the UEFA Champions League second qualifying round. The match in Zagreb ended 2-2, while Dinamo won the return leg in Skopje 1-0. Hamidi played in both matches, while Danfa only appeared in the first game. Danfa is not eligible to play in the UECL group stage this season.

Dinamo played its first match against a Kosovar club in February 1973. In a friendly match at Maksimir Stadium, Dinamo hosted Priština, team from the Capital of Kosovo that competed in a second division. Dinamo won 2-0, with Josip Lalić and Fikret Mujkić scoring the goals.

Ballkani is the fourth Kosovar club to face Dinamo in official competitions. In the former Yugoslav league, Dinamo played against Priština and Trepča. In the Cup games the opponents were Trepča and Vëllaznimi.

In the 1965/66 season, Dinamo defeated Trepča in the Yugoslav Cup quarterfinals. Kosovar team avenged that defeat in the 1977/78 season beating Dinamo in the semifinal. The match was

played as a single game without a return leg, and Trepča won on

penalties after a 0-0 draw in regular time. Later, Rijeka defeated Trepča in the final.

Fatos Beqiraj, a Kosovo native, became the top scorer of the Croatian First Football League (HNL) playing for Dinamo. In the 2011/12 season, he scored 15 goals, becoming the league's top scorer. Beqiraj was born in Kosovo but played for the Montenegro national team. He spent three and a half years at Dinamo.

Two Kosovo-born players and former members of Dinamo, Kujtim Shala and Ardian Kozniku, played for the Croatian national team.

Famous Dinamo coach Miroslav Ćiro Blažević led Kosovar side Priština in the Yugoslav league just three years after winning the championship with Dinamo. He took over the Priština team midseason and managed to avoid the relegation.

In the era of the Yugoslav league, Kujtim Shala, a striker from Priština, became an admired player among Dinamo fans. Born in Prizren, he spent two years in the blue jersey. These were the last two seasons of the Yugoslav league, and Dinamo finished as the runner-up in both.

The first notable footballer of Kosovar origin in Dinamo jersey was the former Hajduk defender Vilson Džoni. He arrived in the summer of 1978 and had an excellent season in which Dinamo won the (unrecognized) championship. In the infamous Tomić case, Dinamo was judicially recognized as the champion, but in the FSJ archive, the title was attributed to Hajduk. Džoni was born in Split, and his family roots trace back to Prizren.

Former Croatian international and Kosovo-born Ardian Kozniku signed for Dinamo in 1998. Previously, he was the top scorer of the Croatian First Football League (HNL) with 12 goals while playing for Hajduk, in the inaugural season played in a shortened calendar, in the spring of 1992

In the 2018/19 season, Kosovar defender Amir Rrahmani, currently playing for Napoli, made a significant contribution to Dinamo European success, reaching the Round of 16 of the UEFA Europa League.

Besnik Hasi, a Kosovo native, played for Dinamo youth team in the early 1990s. He is widely known for his later performances with Belgian side Anderlecht and as a coach who led three clubs to the UEFA Champions League group stages: Anderlecht, Legia, and Olympiacos.

In the mid 1980s, Agim Cana played for Dinamo, the father of Lorik Cana, a well-known Albanian international and former member of PSG and Olympique de Marseille. Agim Cana was bom in Kosovo and came to Dinamo from Priština.

Two players went to the opposite direction, from Dinamo to Priština: Ismet Hadžić and Dragan Lepinjica, the father of Ivan Lepinjica, the current midfielder of Slaven Belupo.

Kosovo international Lirim Kastrati played for Dinamo from the summer of 2020 until September 2021.

Former Dinamo defender Andrej Panadić coached Kosovo side Ferizaj last season.
