Lost 154 sworn members through attrition Retirements, resignations, terminations, death, etc.

We have seen a net loss of 29 officers

This highlights the importance of funding and filling all of our sworn positions in order to be prepared to face the challenges and continue to build safe neighborhoods throughout Richmond or we risk falling behind and being without adequate staffing.

It takes significant time to increase and build up staffing for the future.

#### CY 2017: 13 sworn separations (as of April 17)

- 10 resignations; 3 retirement
- Last year at this time: 9 resignations; 1 retirement
- Since 2013, largest group of resignations is officers with 5-10 years of service (citing: pay compression).

## **PARTNERSHIPS**

- Regional and federal partners
  - Operation Blue Shield a cross border joint operation involving Henrico, Chesterfield, State and Richmond Police to address crimes occurring along jurisdictional boundaries.
  - Violence Suppression Team partnered with State Police and ATF to address gun show illegal purchases to reduce illegal firearms from reaching the street
- Community organizations
  - Built partnership with owners of Rudd's Trailer Park to reduce prostitution and robberies in area
  - Expanded involvement in Latino Community which has led to 18 month strategic plan
  - Increased involvement in Faith Leaders Group which has led to increased expectations and goals for year

# **INNOVATIONS**

- First police agency internationally to involve news media in TASER training to increase awareness and understanding of police use of force
- Virginia Recovery Foundation has increased awareness and provided alternatives to incarceration for persons with opiate addiction
- Twenty-seven persons with addiction placed in treatment programs during first quarter of year
- Developed partnership with ATF to increase firearm tracing and linking to crimes and offenders.
  - Seven firearms have been linked to 15 different crimes including one murder
  - Eight offenders have likewise been linked in this ongoing effort
- Partnering with VCU Health in their Alternative Pathways and RPD Life Programs





- Developed pay compression proposal to address continued attrition of personnel and presented to Council
- 113<sup>th</sup> Academy graduation 17 new officers
- 100 local taxis inspected this quarter
- PALFit Initiative begins, Feb. 2017 teaching youth importance of health and fitness through interactive classes with police officers
- The RPD earned its second Advanced Law Enforcement reaccreditation and received the "Gold Standard With Excellence", a distinction only awarded to 17 other agencies across the country
- 200 Body-worn Cameras were deployed department-wide with 18,850 hours of video recorded
- Lethality Assessment Protocol providing resources to victims of domestic violence, was launched
- Nineteen students successfully completed the third session of the LIFE program

- Successfully managed four major protests including the Inauguration Day and Immigration protests and demonstrations with no major disruptions or arrests during any protest.
- Special Events include the Monument Avenue 10k, where 130 officers managed safety for more than 25k participants
- Conducted joint operation with regional partners and DEA to arrest and seize major heroin/fentanyl dealer in Feb, 2017
- As a result, non-lethal overdoses decreased from 44 in February to 15 in March, a 65% reduction
- Conducted a violent crime Initiative along Midlothian Corridor resulting in a <u>56%</u> reduction in violent crime through search warrants, knock and talk, and other interdiction methods; <u>62</u>
   firearms were seized

- More than 450 adults and youth participated in the MILO Use of Force Training during first quarter of 2017
- Implemented new officer work schedule in conjunction with development of beats within sector – designed to create greater accountability and oversight of individual performance
- Three command staff walks conducted the Oak Grave, Byrd Park, and Swansboro neighborhoods
- RESET deployment in areas of violent crime
- Implemented Patrol Rifle individual officer purchase program and protective rifle plate carrier systems department wide
