











































































































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Portsmouth FC Ladies was formed in 1987, although a Ladies team in Portsmouth can be traced back to the First World War.

The club established itself in the community and until the end of the 2016-17 season had teams for girls and women of all ages.

Portsmouth FC Ladies were the first women's club in Hampshire to

receive The FA Charter Standard Award for excellence in provision of coaching and support staff, and also gaining the Adult Status in December 2007. The club won the 2014-15 WPL Southern Division but lost out in the promotion play-off to Sheffield FC's 92ndminute winner.

In July 2018, Portsmouth changed from Ladies to Women, and the club

became a part of the official Portsmouth FC umbrella.

Portsmouth FC Women's notable honours include 15x Hampshire Cups, 4x Portsmouth Divisional Cups, 2x Women's Premier League Southern Division Titles, 1x South West Combination Football League and 1x South West Combination League Cup.

Argyle Women 2 Whitmore 58, Pomfret 90+4 Argyle Women took all three points in a dramatic game of two halves at Bauvill Stadium last weekend.

Chatham took an early lead through Letitia Nicholls after pressure on the Argyle defence caught the Greens off guard. Chatham continued to fashion out dangerous chances as the half went on, but Argyle showed signs of improvement. The second half began with Argyle piling the pressure on Chatham, who made it 13 minutes into the half until Charlotte Whitmore brought the scoreline level.

The Greens continued to battle as the game drew to a close, but Chatham equally tried to regain the lead through multiple dangerous chances in the area, but none could find a way past Jasmine Read who stopped each chance. Argyle took their chance to steal victory in the 94th minute

thanks to Taya Pomfret, whose late run at the far post met a corner from Whitmore, securing three points in the dying embers of the match.

Chatham began the match with high tempo, pressing Argyle into their half from the referee's whistle. Their pressure proved to be too much for the Argyle defence who conceded early on following a defensive error outside the 18-yard box that allowed Nicholls to pounce on a loose ball in the area following a save at the far post by Read.

Chatham continued to be a threat throughout the half, but Argyle's defence stood firm and denied the home side a chance at extending their lead further. Meanwhile, Argyle's determination and grit began to grow and chances to equalise became more common. The Greens closest chance of the half came to Ellie Sara who after

regaining the ball from a spilled save in the area attempted to blast the ball home, but Davies and her defence did well to clear the danger.

Argyle's performance in the second half continued to improve and following a sin bin for Chatham, the Greens took their chance to level the scoreline. A superb counter-attack launched by Sara from deep found the run of Whitmore who cut inside on her right foot and placed the ball into the top right corner, sending the Argyle players into joy and stunning the keeper Davies.

Motivated even further by Whitmore's leveller The Greens continued to put pressure on the home side but struggled to convert their chances into goals. As the match drew closer to full-time Chatham gradually began to take control of the game once more and fashioned out numerous chances from set pieces,



but the incredible reactionary saves from Read and blocks in the penalty area from the Argyle defence continued to frustrate Chatham's forwards. Chatham were eventually able to find the back of the net in the 90th minute, but the referee's assistant flagged the goal offside, keeping the scoreline intact.

With 90 minutes of regular play done and 14 minutes of extra time added, Argyle found their chance to take the lead from a corner. Whitmore's delivery placed the ball towards the far post and just missed the head of captain Panagiota Papaioannou, but a late run from Taya Pomfret connected with the loose ball and hammered home Argyle's second in the 94th minute.

Read was called upon on multiple occasions following Argyle's goal, making tremendous lastminute saves to hold on to vital points on the road, one being a stop on the line following a series of scrappy shots in the area from a corner. Chatham continued to fight for an equaliser as the game drew closer to its end, but the Argyle defence proved too strong to beat and following a sensational clearance from Pomfret the referee blew for full time, sending the Argyle players into raptures.

NEWS ARGYLE STAFF UNDERGO MENTAL HEALTH FIRST AID TRAINING

We all have mental health, and just like physical health, it needs looking after.

One in four of us will experience a mental health issue in any given year.

Learning more about our mental health and ways to get support can empower people to thrive and that's why Argyle as a club has taken an important step to get as many of its staff trained to not only support players and fans, but staff too.

15 employees from across the club undertook a two day course this week to become Mental Health First Aiders to coincide with World Mental Health Day.

There was representation from throughout the whole club, including a focus on Academy staff members to ensure our young players can safely navigate through their critical development years, both physically and socially, as well as managing the experiences of school and exams.

The Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) course uses both national and international research and lived experience insight to create MHFA courses to benefit individuals and the people they live and work with.



The courses are intended to increase mental health knowledge and confidence and give people the skills to recognise signs of mental ill health in both children and adults. The training can reduce stigma and increase people's willingness to support.

Mackenzie Brown, Argyle Head of Academy Player Care and Wellbeing said of the initiative: The mental health and welfare of the young people in our Academy is at the forefront of everything we do and to have so many Academy staff across different disciplines completing this course is fantastic. This training is going to contribute to ensuring that we continue to offer the best support possible."

The mental health issues covered included depression, anxiety, eating disorders, psychosis, and substance misuse while the mental health crises covered were suicidal thoughts, self-harm, panic attacks, and trauma.

Siobhan Robbie-James Argyle Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Manager added: "The knowledge and skills I have learned from the course have given me the confidence to start conversations and hopefully be able to support individuals should they need support.

"I'm really pleased that so many staff volunteered to undertake the training and I hope that it will make a positive impact to our workplace, our players, and fans for years to come."

Over the past 20 years the importance of improving the physical, mental, and emotional health and wellbeing of children and young people has been especially important in the UK and through the government.

A mentally healthy community is a productive and creative one. Argyle is taking a whole-organisation approach – with trained personnel in nearly all departments across the Club and partner sites – together to make a positive change to conversations around mental health.
