Note: A word of warning about buying woodworking tools. Only buy what you want to finish your immediate or upcoming project. This is important especially if you are a beginner and just beginning. Tools are not cheap. The beginner needs good woodworking gear, but you can easily break the bank buying lot of tools you may not utilize all that often. If you do buy tools, buy quality. Do a bit of research and compare goods. Buy the best that you could afford at the time.

A claw hammer, wood chisel set, a hand saw, a miter box with a saw (for cutting angles), a coping saw, complete punches, horizontal and straight tilt screwdrivers, a rubber mallet (for tapping pieces together while not damaging the wood), woodworking clamps, a wood vise, a seat plane, a rasp, a tape measure, a 12" steel ruler, a 6" steel square, and do not overlook the wood glue and a brush to spread the wood glue! Obviously you'll require a dry area to work and may need a set of horses to work on.
