Klaus Schwab pushes Sigrid Kaag forward as Rutte's successor. Who is Sigrid Kaag?

The 58-year-old Sigrid Kaag has once again increased the power of the WHO and 't World Economic Forum.

In 2017, she joined Cabinet Rutte III after a year-long career at the United Nations. For the general public at the time, she was an unknown.

Kaag worked at the United Nations for many years as a diplomat. She broke through internationally in 2013 when she led the disarmament mission in Syria on behalf of the Security Council. She was the list leader for D66 in the 2021 elections.

Recently, Kaag has the ambition to become the first female prime minister of the Netherlands. From the way she is now suddenly put forward in the media, it is clear that this is also the plan from higher up, especially now that Rutte has a mountain of misery and of scandals behind him.

Millions in D66 Campaign

Sigrid Kaag raised in Zeist.

Sigrid Kaag was born in Rijswijk and grew up in Zeist. Her father is a musician, her mother a teacher. When Kaag is six years old, her little brother dies shortly after his birth. "That was a huge grief for my

parents and that has left a mark on our family," Kaag told EO platform Lazarus.

Kaag's Life Turned Upside Down

In the early 1970s, the family's life is once again turned upside down when doctors diagnose Kaag's mother with a brain tumor. She undergoes several operations of which it is not certain whether she will survive. Eventually she becomes partially deaf and blind and has to learn to walk and talk again.

It was during this period that Kaag's father became severely overworked and depressed. He is admitted to a sanatorium.

With two seriously ill parents, 12-year-old Kaag was forced to spend six months with a foster family: the parents of a friend from the field hockey team. Her sister ends up in another family and also goes to another school.

"It's nicer when you have healthy parents who are involved in everything. But if you don't, then you are taught early on to go on alone, to deal with setbacks," Kaag once told the Volkskrant about her childhood.

Secret marriage Sigrid Kaag with Palestinian Anis Al-Qaq
Sigrid Kaag is married to Anis Al-Qaq. Anis Al-Qaq has been a politician for years for the Fatah, a Palestinian party labeled "terrorist" by America and the European Union, among others. Anis also served as shadow health minister for the PLO, the movement of leader Yasser Arafat. Today, however, he is Palestinian ambassador to Switzerland.

Anis Al-Qaq and Sigrid Kaag secretly married in 1993 in Jerusalem, having met less than a year earlier in the Middle East when Sigrid was

on a working visit there. When the relationship became known to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, she had to relinquish her position of trust.

Sigrid Kaag lives in The Hague

Sigrid Kaag lives at Cornelis Jolstraat 12 in The Hague in the fishing district in a 1906 mansion of 181 m² with an estimated value of € 847,000 to 895,000. Remarkable in this regard is the energy label G, while D66 focuses on energy efficient and sustainable housing.

The Secret Marriage

Data from the Land Registry shows that Sigrid bought her house in The Hague without her husband Anis. In fact, Sigrid's marital status is described as follows: 'unmarried and no registered partnership (at the time of acquisition)'. Nevertheless, Sigrid tells Frank Evenblij that she and her husband Anis are really married: 'We have been married for 26 years, have four children and are still together.'

Sigrid's spokesman Chris Bakker says: "Sigrid Kaag is officially married, but it is true that in the Land Registry it says 'unmarried' under civil status. That has an administrative reason: Sigrid was married in Israel in 1993. She also declared that at the time to the Municipality of The Hague. When she returned to the Netherlands in 2017, she again declared that she was married. She needed a legalized translation of a copy of the Israeli marriage certificate for this purpose and was advised to arrange this in Israel. That has not yet come to pass. Of course, it could also be that she is not very eager to go public with this. As long as this is not formally arranged, Minister Kaag is listed as "unmarried" in the basic registration.

Sigrid Kaag is also known for her flair for languages. Partly thanks to her relationship with husband Anis Al-Qaq she speaks fluent Arabic, but also Dutch, English, French, Spanish and German.

Terrorists paid with Dutch tax money

The Netherlands had been warned about links between Palestinian terrorists and the aid organization UAWC, which received funding from the Ministry of Foreign Trade and Development Cooperation.

The UAWC was said to have ties to the Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine (PFLP). The latter group was designated a terrorist organization by the United States in 1997 and is also on the European Union's terror list.

Sigrid Kaag responsible for payment of terrorists

For a long time, the salary of the two suspects in the deadly bombing was paid in part thanks to subsidies provided by the Dutch Minister for Development Cooperation. The two also had a pass from the Dutch representation in the Palestinian territories.

Responsible Minister Kaag suspended subsidies to the UAWC last July. The Netherlands has been funding the union since 2007. The UAWC had been allocated 11.7 million euros for the period 2017 to 2021. With this, the organization stimulates the professionalization of Palestinian farmers through, among other things, the reuse of rainwater.

Important role in contact with elite organizations UN/WHO/WEF
Kaag started working as a consultant at the United Nations in 1994 where she worked from Khartoum in Sudan. From 1998 to 2004 she was "Chief of Donor Relations for the International Organization for Migration" and "Senior Programme Manager" at UNRWA's external relations office in Jerusalem. With her work in the Middle East, she dealt with occupied territories in Palestine, Lebanon, Jordan and Syria.

As of 2018, Kaag has a role in the collaboration between the World Bank and the WHO Global Preparedness Monitoring Board (GPMB). In 2019, she joined the "High-Level Group on Humanitarian Investing", of the World Economic Forum by Klaus Schwab.

Already backtracking from purely populist statement

After the election results in favor of D66, Sigrid Kaag was already gleefully sorting out the OMT opinion of the Catshuis consultations. "That curfew? That must come off very quickly," Kaag said Friday in front of the cameras. With the upcoming switch to daylight saving time "it becomes even more difficult. Kaag feared that with the start of daylight saving time, next Sunday, especially young people will have trouble keeping to it. "The stretch is out of many people," she said.

Not much later it came out that 7400 new infections had been reported in the 24 hours before. Nothing alarming since the infection rate has been dropping since last October. However, the media forgot to mention this. However, with these figures, Kaag quickly backtracked and suddenly regretted her hopeful statements.

She informed a number of ministers that she had been a bit too short with her statements. She had not "expressed herself so conveniently" which meant that the statement "gave the wrong impression.
