The region is also famous among adventure enthusiasts as they enjoy hiking, mountain biking, back-country skiing, and much more.

Old State House, Boston



This ancient cemetery in Rhode Island is tucked away on a hill, which makes it even more horrific. Visitors to the cemetery often report that they feel someone is watching them. The old cemetery looks quite weird because of its uncombed grounds, rugged terrain, old gravestones and untrimmed bushes
